Grant to Roger Plantyn, butler of R. earl of Norfolk and marshal of England, of what pertains to the king of the wardship of lands late of William le May of Causton and of the heir or heirs of the said William whereof Joan late his wife so said to be pregnant; with the marriage of the heirs of the said Joan. PR vol.4 p.700 Causton = Cawston, county Norfolk.

[#] PR Edward I vol 2, p.179: July 1 1285 at Westminster: Pardon to John de Romeham, Henry Plauntain and others of the county of Buckinghamshire, for the death of William le Geoler, a thief, whom they pursued with hue from that county to Old Wyndesor, in the county of Berks, and slew him as one fleeing from justice.

1258 Roger Plantyn granted lands of William le May of Cawston, county Norfolk

1275 Roger Plantig' holds lands previously held by William May in Lincolnshire

RH vol.1, p.294 – *Lincolnshire* – Hundred of Haverstoe in Lindsey Riding

Also, William May held of the same soke 100s rent per annum by gift of king Henry of the same, and now Richard de Bruus holds, of that 100s yearly rent, 30s, but from whom or by what service or by what warrant they know not.

Also Roger Plantig' holds, of the same 100s rent per annum, 46d 8d rent per annum, (but) from whom nor by what service in Lincolnshire nor by what warrant they know not.

1275 Will' Plauntes – the Isle of Flegg was a few miles north of Yarmouth, which is listed as importing *wines* by 1281-5 and into the fifteenth century [M K James, *Medieval Wine Trade*, (Clarendon, Oxford, 1971), p.95-116]

They say that William Clericus [Clerk] the coroner has taken from William Plauntes ½ mark [6s 8d] for him, dismissed until the next coming of the Justices.

1279 Rog' Plante and Rob' Plante (and 3 others)

– Northstowe, NW of Cambridge, between river *Ouse* to the north and road from Cambridge to St Neots to south.

cf. Upstream on the Ouse: John Plaunte 1309 is almost certainly identical with John *Planterose* 1332 both taxed at Riseley in Subsidy Rolls, Bedfordshire [Peter McClure]; cf. Anglo Norman Dictionary [AN *Secr WATERFORD*¹ 97.932] describes wines made from red grapes (c.1300; MS: c.1300) wines start white but become the colour of rose (sic) after a year and then red (rouge) after two years.

Also, there, John de Ragenhale holds and defends from the said fee 1 acre of meadow in the same township and has in villenage Roger Plante (&) Robert Plante. Reginald Basat, Richard son of Lob, John son of Dulle, of whom each of them holds 5 acres as in lands and meadows, and each of them renders to the aforesaid John de Ragenhale per annum 9s for rents and works and scutage and suit, and the said John de Ragenhale renders to the church of All Saints at Stanton 4d per annum, and they owe scutage and ward at Richmond, and sheriff's aid and view of frankpledge, and it is at the will of the lord.

– also in Northstowe Hundred, between river Ouse to the north and Cambridge to St Neots road to south.

There William Plante holds from the aforesaid Robert a messuage and a croft that contains 1 acre of land, and he renders therefor to the same per annum 12d

1279 Marger' Plantcroft (and 2 others)

? cf. leefsel, wine room, Parson's tale, Chaucer (1395)**

– Papworth Hundred was between Northstowe (as above) to its east and Huntingdonshire to its west;

RH vol.2, p.468 – *Cambridgeshire* – Papworth Hundred

Nicholas de Knapwelle, Roger de Helton (&) Margery Plantcroft hold two parts of 5 acres from the same fee and render to the same 2s per annum and suit of court every three weeks, and sheriff's aid 2d

1279 Wills Plantefolye

– Godington is a small village about 2 miles east of *Stratton Audley*
